I had the opportunity to tour the Neiley Sewage and Treatment Works.

There I met the team and learned about their essential work in maintaining water quality and environmental health.

During the visit I was able to test the water for ammonia in the River Holme, where we recorded an impressive 0.05 against the permitted level of 3.0!

I will continue to hold Yorkshire Water to account in order that they further protect our waterways, fix leaks and improve customer service.
